Outline of the Messages for the Full-time Training in the Spring Term of 2008

GENERAL SUBJECT: THE BELIEVERS

Message Forty-Five

Their Present—Experiencing the Dispensing of the Divine Trinity in Serving and Worshipping God and in Working and Laboring for the Lord

Scripture Reading: John 4:23-24; Rom. 1:9; 1 Cor. 3:12; 15:10, 58; 16:10; 2 Cor. 1:8-9; 4:7

- I. For all the requirements related to the believers, which are revealed in the New Testament, we need to receive the divine supply through the dispensing of the processed Triune God—Heb. 4:16; Rom. 5:17, 21; Num. 6:1-8, 22-27; 2 Cor. 13:14.
- II. We experience the dispensing of the Divine Trinity in serving and worshipping God—Matt. 4:9-10:
 - A. In the New Testament, serving God is actually the same as worshipping God—vv. 9-10; S. S. 1:2; cf. Psa. 2:11-12:
 - 1. To worship God is to contact God in spirit with Christ as the reality of the offerings and to drink of God—Jer. 2:13; John 4:10, 23-24; 1 Cor. 12:13.
 - 2. To worship God is to enjoy God by feasting on God—Deut. 12:5-7; 1 Cor. 5:8.
 - 3. To worship God is to love God in fellowship with God—Mark 12:30; 1 John 1:3.
 - 4. To worship God is to honor God by walking by the Spirit and to cheer God by enjoying Christ as our cheering love and invigorating life—Judg. 9:9, 13; Psa. 104:15; Gal. 5:25; Matt. 9:17; 2 Cor. 5:14-15; S. S. 1:2; cf. 4:10.
 - B. We have "turned to God from the idols to serve a living and true God"—1 Thes. 1:9; Acts 26:18:
 - 1. God must be living to us and in us in every aspect of our daily life; He controls us, directs us, corrects us, adjusts us, and deals with us, even in such small things as our thoughts and motives—Psa. 139:23-24; Matt. 5:8; 2 Thes. 3:5.
 - 2. As believers in Christ, we must live a life that bears the testimony that the God whom we worship and serve is living in the details of our life; the reason we do not do or say certain things should be that God is living in us—Rom. 8:6; cf. Gen. 2:9.
 - C. When we come to serve God, or worship God, we need a blood-purified conscience; our defiled conscience needs to be purified so that we may serve God in a living way—Heb. 9:14; 10:22; 1 John 1:7, 9; Acts 24:16; cf. 1 Tim. 4:7.
 - D. To serve and worship God are to walk in newness of life and to serve in newness of spirit—Rom. 6:4; 7:6; cf. Ezek. 36:26-27.
 - E. We serve and worship God in our spirit in the gospel of God's Son—Rom. 1:9:
 - 1. To serve God in the gospel is to serve Him in the all-inclusive Christ, because the gospel is simply Christ Himself—Acts 5:42; Rom. 1:1-4; 8:29; 15:16.
 - 2. In order to preach the gospel of God's Son, we must be in our regenerated spirit (1:9); whatever we are (2:29; 8:5-6, 9), whatever we have (vv. 10, 16), and whatever we do toward God (1:9; 7:6; 8:4, 13; 12:11) must be in our spirit.
 - 3. Paul served God in his regenerated spirit by the indwelling Christ, the life-giving Spirit, not in his soul by the power and ability of the soul.
 - F. "We are the circumcision, the ones who serve by the Spirit of God and boast in Christ Jesus and have no confidence in the flesh"—Phil. 3:3; cf. Rom. 2:28-29:

- 1. The flesh refers to all that we are and have in our natural being; as believers in Christ, we should not trust in anything that we have by our natural birth, for everything of our natural birth is part of the flesh, our fallen nature—Phil. 3:4-6.
- 2. We need the Lord's light to shine on us concerning our nature, our deeds, and our confidence in the flesh; we need to be enlightened by the Lord to see that we still live too much by the flesh and that we boast in our deeds and qualifications.
- 3. We need the Lord's light to shine on us so that we have no trust in our natural qualities, qualifications, ability, or intelligence; only then shall we be able to testify that our confidence is wholly in the Lord; after we are enlightened in this way, we shall truly serve and worship God in our spirit and by the Spirit—vv. 7-8.

III. We experience the dispensing of the Divine Trinity in working and laboring for the Lord—1 Cor. 3:12; 15:10, 58; 16:10:

- A. Our work and labor for the Lord are not by our natural life and natural ability but by the pneumatic Christ as our resurrection life and power—Num. 17:8; 1 Cor. 15:10, 58:
 - 1. When we do not live by our natural life, but live by the divine life within us, we are in resurrection; the issue of this is the Body of Christ—Phil. 3:10-11.
 - 2. The golden lampstand, typifying the church as the Body of Christ, portrays Christ as the resurrection life, growing, branching, budding, and blossoming to shine out the light—Exo. 25:31-40; Num. 17:8; Rev. 1:11-12; Matt. 5:14; Isa. 60:1, 5.
 - 3. All those who know resurrection have given up hope in themselves; they know that they cannot make it; everything that is of death belongs to us, and everything that is of life belongs to the Lord—2 Cor. 1:8-9; cf. Eccl. 9:4.
 - 4. We must acknowledge that we are nothing, have nothing, and can do nothing; we must come to the end of ourselves to be convinced of our utter uselessness—Exo. 2:14-15; 3:14-15; Luke 22:32-33; 1 Pet. 5:5-6.
 - 5. The life-giving Spirit is the reality of resurrection; the resurrected Christ as the life-giving Spirit lives in us, enabling us to do what we could never do in ourselves—1 Cor. 15:10, 45b; 2 Cor. 4:7-18.
- B. Our work and labor for the Lord are to minister Christ as life to the saints with the nourishing words of the new testament faith—1 Tim. 4:6; 2 Cor. 3:3, 6; Psa. 45:1-2:
 - 1. We must first be nourished with Christ; then we shall have Christ as the life supply to minister to others—1 Tim. 4:6; 1 Pet. 4:10-11; 1 Thes. 2:7-8.
 - 2. Our ministering of Christ to others should be in all purity and in all wisdom— 1 Tim. 5:1-2; 2 Chron. 1:10; Col. 1:28-29; 2:2.
- C. We must shepherd the saints as the flock of God according to God, that is, according to God's nature, desire, way, and glory—Acts 20:28; 1 Pet. 5:1-6; cf. Mal. 3:14.
- D. We build up the church with the experiences of the processed Triune God as gold, silver, and precious stones—1 Cor. 14:4b, 12; 3:12; cf. S. S. 1:10-11.
- E. The believers work and labor for the Lord with prayer and fasting—Matt. 17:21; Acts 1:14; 6:4; 13:2:
 - 1. The real meaning of fasting is to stop eating all things other than the Lord Jesus and to not have a taste for anything other than Him—Matt. 5:6; Luke 1:53.
 - 2. Our prayer to God should be toward Christ, the kingdom of God, and the house of God as the goal in God's eternal economy—1 Kings 8:48; Dan. 6:10.
- F. The believers who work and labor for the Lord will be rewarded by the returning Lord in the day of the resurrection of the righteous—1 Cor. 3:14; Matt. 24:45-47; 25:21-23; Luke 14:14.
